

Onekama Community Master Plan
Vision Session II
July 17, 2008

Summary

Approximately fifty-eight residents, business owners, community members, and Village and Township officials all interested in voicing their ideas about the Onekama community participated in the second visioning process on July 17, 2008. This session was scheduled particularly to give season residents an opportunity to engage in the process and have their voices heard. The session consisted of a series of brainstorming exercises in which small groups of participants worked together to formulate ideas about the future of the community.

During the workshops participants outlined some of the issues concerning the Village and Township. They focused on particular areas of concern, then recorded their ideas and established priorities by voting for those most important to them. Finally, they shared their results with the entire audience. The ideas that came out of each small group were diverse, but they also had many commonalities.

Presented here, organized around the brainstorming exercises, are the results.

Exercise One: Understanding the Present

Small group discussion: Participants are asked to brainstorm the things they feel most proud and most sorry about the Onekama Community. This discussion follows the rules of brainstorming. After each group has compiled their list, each member is given three dots and is asked to vote on the proudest "prouds" and the sorriest "sorries". The group determines the three top prouds and sorries. Sheets are collected from each table and posted on the wall.

Exercise Three: The Preferred Future

The participants were invited to take an imaginary ride through the Onekama Community in the year 2018. Each participant was asked to describe the images they saw that pleased them the most. These preferred images were recorded in the present tense, using the rules of brainstorming. The discussion moved from one participant to the next without excessive discussion. Each group used the topics explored in the previous discussion as an example of images to describe. Participants were encouraged to visualize other communities and consider if there are businesses or other types of land use development that they have seen in other communities that they would like to see in the Onekama Community.
